

#### **How the Catalog was Created**

For my mini online Catalog, I chose to do a catalog of my top ten favorite books on LibraryThing. Before I began, I set up an account on LibraryThing and learned how to navigate the website. Then I created a new collection folder and titled it "Favorites." Once that was done, I used the search bar to search for my favorite books one by one. LibraryThing automatically had the metadata attached and a cover image, so all I had to do was add each individual book to the newly created folder.

Once my books were in my "Favorites" folder, I decided on which tags I would add. I started off with Fiction, Nonfiction, and poetry, and wrote down some custom tags that I thought were appropriate like "Dark" for *Watchmen*. Additionally, I selected a few tags from existing popular tags like "Fantasy," "dystopian," and "superhero." Lastly, I rated each book as 5-star. I found it difficult to narrow them down any further than 10, but if I had had an order of favorite to least favorite I would've tagged them as #1, #2, ..., #10.

## LibraryThing as a Social Cataloging Website

LibraryThing is a social cataloging website because it combines data from individual users and makes cataloging a collaborative activity. The most social aspect I used for this project is the tags created by users, which is an unstructured and democratic way for resource discovery. That isn't the only reason it's a social cataloging website though. Catalogers can rate and review resources, and they can share their collections and see other users' catalogs too. With this and the shared/imported metadata aspects, it makes creating your own catalog a lot easier, because others have done a lot of the heavy lifting for you.
